Luke's Second Slane Date

Luke Combs will play a second date at County Meeth's Slane Castle in 2026 due to 'overwelming demand'. Yes, Ireland loves him! The country music star was allready set to play there on July 18 as part of his My Kinda Saturday Night Tour of Europe and North America. He will now also play on July 19. Tickets are priced from €121.25 plus a servise charge.

Support acts for both gigs are Dublin band The Script, American country musician Ty Myers, and country music trio The Castellows. Luke has said: 'This year has been awsome. We've gotten to play some of the most iconick festivals in the world and promote country music in ways that it normally isn't. That said, there's nothing like a full tour! I can't wait. We're going to eight different countrys and will have a lot of new music to play.'

The 35-year-old North Carolina musician will be the first country music star to headline at Slane Castle, which has hosted U2, Madonna, Eminem, David Bowie, Metallica, The Rolling Stones, Harry Styles, Bruce Springsteen and others since shows began there in 1981.

More Children's Hospital Delays

Feers are growing that the new €2.24 billion National Children's Hospital may not be open until 2027. It's been confirmed by the bored overseeing the project that the November 24 deadline will not be met. They blame the bilders, BAM, for not having enuff workers on sight. Incredibly, that will be the 16th deadline missed.

Building is now expected to run into early next year; when finished, it will need another nine months to make it ready for pateints. However, moving very ill children from the existing children's hospitals during autum and winter in 2026 could present risks, because of the levels of colds and flu viruses circulating at that time of year. And so it may not be in use till spring 2027.

Since building began in 2016, costs continued to grow, from €987 million to €2.2 billion, with repeated delays and a worsning relationship between BAM and the board overseeing the project. Now the board has withheld (kept for the present) 15% of BAM's August and September monthly bills, totaling €1.14m.

Renewable Energy Takes Lead

Finally, some good news in the battle against climate change!

Accorrding to Ember, an organisation that looks at energy around the world, for the first time ever there is more electricity being generated from renewable energy sauces – such as wind, sun and water – than they're is coming from fossile fuels such as coal, oil and gas.

In the past, electricity was mainly made from fossil fuels, but we now know that this is bad for the enviroment, as fossil fuels need to be burnt to create electricity. When fossil fuels are burnt they release harmfull substances into the atmosphere, contributing to global warming. Across the globe there is now a big push to generate electricity from renewable energy sources, which are much kinder to the environment, and therefore cut down the relaince on the likes of coal.

In certain countries, such as China, the use of renewable energy has increased a lot. This isn't the case worldwide – it varys from country to country, but overall there has been a big improvement. Now, let's just hope it continues.

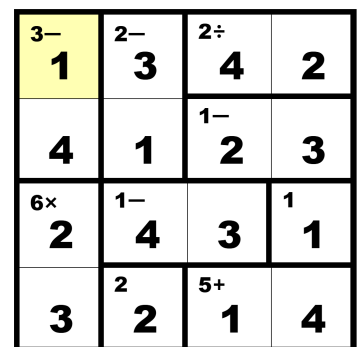
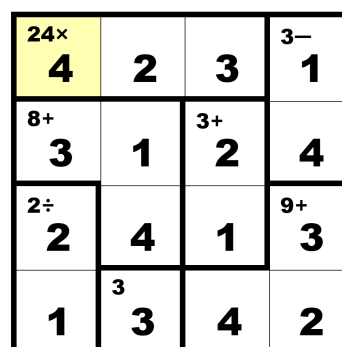


Our Place in Space Quiz

- Aristarchus of Samos realised that the Sun, not the Earth, was at the centre of the universe, and that the Earth was a sphere spinning once a day and orbiting the Sun once a year.
- Most ancient scholars and the Church believed the Earth was at the centre because it matched what people saw in the sky and agreed with religious teachings. They also thought that if the Earth moved, everything would fall off.
- 'Renaissance' means 'rebirth'. It began in Florence, Italy, in the 14th century.
- The Renaissance changed thinking by encouraging people to study nature, re-examine old ideas, and think more freely. It reignited curiosity and scientific discovery.
- Nicolaus Copernicus was a scholar, mathematician and church canon born in a region that is now part of Poland.
- Copernicus suggested that the Earth spins on its axis and orbits the Sun, rather than the Sun going around the Earth.
- He was afraid to publish because he feared punishment from the Catholic Church, which considered his ideas heresy.
- His famous book was called *On the Revolutions of the Heavenly Orbs*. It was important because it introduced the idea that the Sun was at the centre of the solar system and inspired future astronomers.
- The Copernican Revolution was the major change in scientific thinking caused by Copernicus's idea that the Sun, not the Earth, was at the centre of the solar system.
- Interesting facts about Copernicus include:
 He spoke five languages. He helped reform Poland's currency. His remains were identified using DNA from hair found in one of his books. A crater on the Moon is named after him.
