Detector Dogs

Towards the end of May, Revenue Offciers seized controband worth over €695,000, including tobacco products and alchol. Detector dog Toby assisted in the seizures. A highly skilled Springer Spaniel sniffer dog, he is famous for his exceptional abiltiy to sniff out large quantities of illegal cash – he once toted up a massive €3 million haul in a single week.

Detector dog Ciara, also a Springer Spaniel, has a keen sense of smell that has disrupted numerous international smuggling operashuns. In February 2026 she uncovered nearly €100,000 worth of contraband. In May 2026, she played a part in the major Revenue crackdwon, sniffing out illicit drugs hidden in parcels.

Springer Spaniel Sam has retired after the recent crackdown, having received a Golden Paw Hero Dog Award for his amazing work. During his seven-year career he was credited with over 1,000 detecions and sniffed out contraband worth over €10 million. The judges praised Sam's heart, courage, loylty and unerring accuracy in disrupting criminal networks, saying the public are not sufficiently aware of the vital role dogs play in such operations.

Did you know? Irish sniffer dogs are trained at the Garda National Dog Unit Headquarters, Kilmainham, Dublin, and the Garda College, Templemore, Co. Tipperary. Spcialised Revenue Customs dogs are also trained at the UK Defence Animal Training Centre.

Shrinking Chocolate

Have you noticed that chocolate bars seem to be shrinking in size while the prices keep going up? This 'shrinkflation' appears to be due to rising manufacturing costs. However, in what has been deemed a 'sneaky' tactic by UK consumer group Which?, it appears that customers are being misled by chocolate manufacturers selling smaller bars of chocolate in the same kind of wrapper used for a bar of a bigger size.

Hamburg's consumer protection office (VZHH) in Germany decided to tackle this issue head-on and took the company Mondelēz, the manufacturer of Milka chocolate (as well as Cadbury's and Oreo), to court.

After a three-week court case, the court found Mondelēz to be guilty of cheating consumers and breaking competition law with its classic 'Alpenmilch' bar. It had been cut to 90% of its original size, making it thinner, but was being sold in the same kind of wrapper that customers had been used to for years, misleading them into thinking it was the same chocolate they had always been buying, despite its higher price.

The reason for the rising prices is that the global cost of cocoa has risen due to poor harvests in West Africa. And it isn't just Mondelēz that has been affected by it, but other chocolate manufacturers too, including German company Ritter Sport.

Shrinkflation is not just affecting chocolate – toothpaste, oats and coffee have also been affected.

Did you know? The name 'Milka' is a combination of the German words for the main two ingredients used to make the chocolate – milch (milk) and kakao (cocoa).

Cuppa Affected by Climate Change

With more frequent storms, flooding and unpredictable wether, the effect of climite change on our weather systems has become very apparant over the past number of years. However, did you know that the effects of climate change are not just limited to the weather? However, did you know climate change can also affect what we eat and drink?

In many ways it makes sense. Farmers relie on the weather in order to grow crops, so dramatic changes in weather are going to have an effect on how food is produced.

One of the products that is afected by this is the humble cup of tea. Due to more extreme weather and rising temperatures, tea is likely to be more inconsistant in flavour, as well as having a more bitter and harsher taste when it is grown in countries such as Kenya, India and Sri Lanka. This issue is also affecting tea growers in other countrys around the world.

The charity Christian Aid is calling for help to support farmers to continue to be able to produce tea, despite the challenges of climate change. Tea is a drink popular across the world and climate change is an ongoing problem, so it is imperitive that measures are put in place to help and support those who produce it.

Did you know? Despite being Ireland's unofficial national drink, tea didn't actually arrive in Ireland until the 1800s. It was very expensive to import and was seen as a luxury, only afforded by the very wealthy.

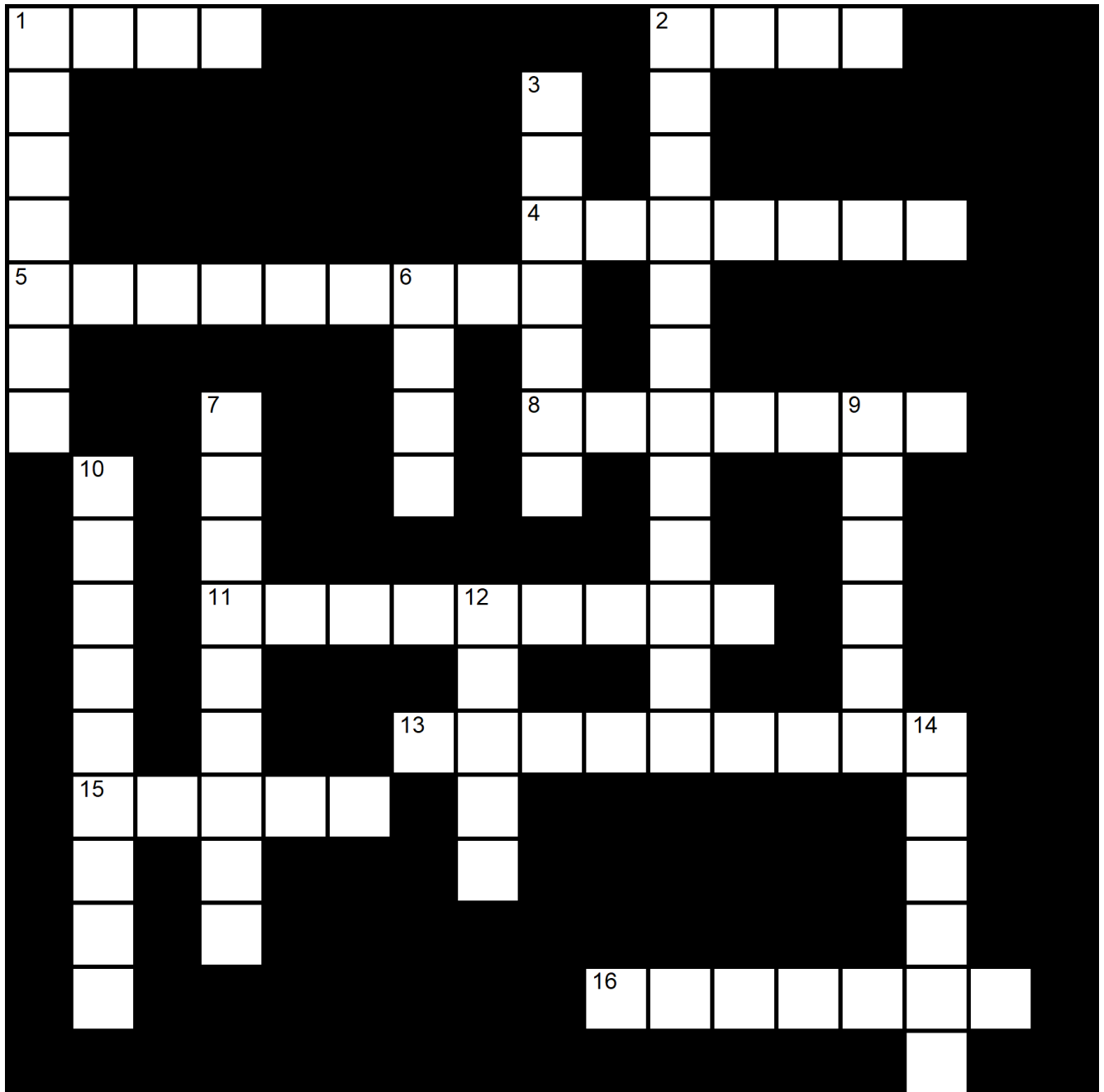

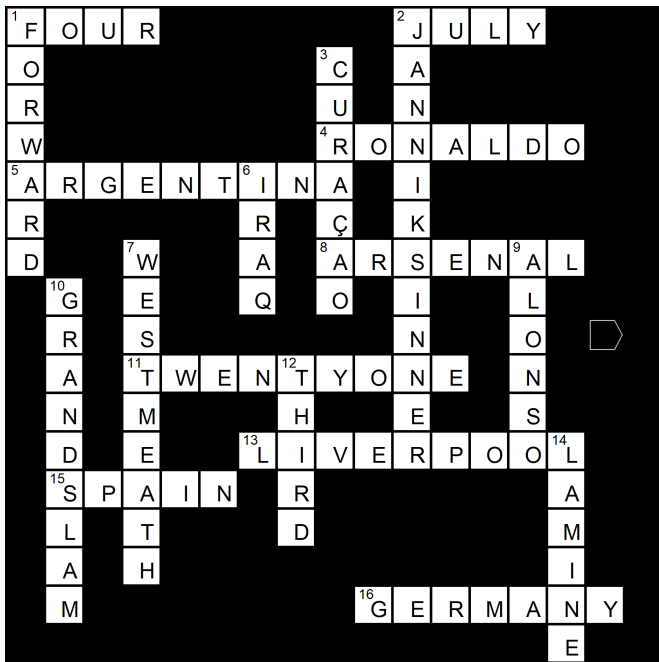

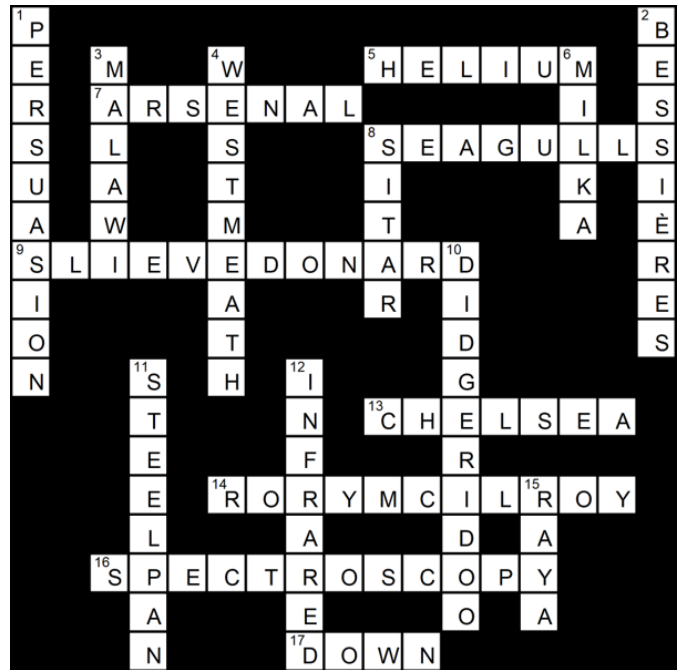
